The keynote speaker will be Victor Mair, from the Department of East Asian Languages and Civilizations at the University of Pennsylvania.

We welcome papers on pre-Song China from a variety of disciplinary perspectives, including anthropology, archaeology, art history, history, literature, philosophy, and religion. Founded in 1997, the Southeast Early China Roundtable (SEECR) is a group of scholars from the south Atlantic region who specialize or maintain an interest in the study of pre-modern China, especially from the earliest period through the Tang dynasty. The purpose of the group is twofold -- first, to provide a forum for specialist discussion of all aspects of early China studies through yearly meetings; and second, to promote the study of early China in the Southeast by sponsoring public non-specialist lectures. SEECR members typically host annual meetings at their academic institutions, providing meals, accommodations and meeting space for participants.
